Issues raised around ASB at ward panels and wards are tackled jointly by the SNTs and the ASB Team. Recently, further investment has been put in by the creation of a graffiti officer who supports all 21 teams - carrying out environmental audits, investigating individuals and carrying out investigations on graffiti tags. The borough ASB co-ordinator develops ASB systems for the police i.e. home visit policies and ASB letters used to comply with the police EPIC system.</p>
Other	<p>Brent's CDRP is a mature partnership, which can be illustrated by the way in which budgets are pooled and joint (CDRP) decisions are made. In 2008/09, as in previous years, the funds earmarked for crime & disorder reduction activity (this year forming part of the Area Based Grant, previously SSCF) were combined with other CDRP funds (e.g. BCU fund, MPA fund), and were jointly allocated according to CDRP priorities. Part 1 - PCSOs	Joint intelligence briefings and patrols are being conducted with PCSOs and Hounslow Homes Neighbourhood Wardens to enable a more coordinated response in tackling crime and anti social behaviour in the local neighbourhoods.

Part 3 – Support in Kind	<p>In Hounslow, local police have committed to seconding a Police Inspector to work in the Community Safety Team at the Council. Similarly, the local authority has seconded the Community Safety Officer for anti-social behaviour into the specialist ASBO Unit at the Police Station.</p> <p>Two officers from the local authority are jointly supervised by Police Sector Inspectors overseeing the Hounslow Business Against Crime Initiative. This initiative supports the local policing agenda of tackling crime in and around town centres across the borough.</p> <p>Reducing violence against the person is a key priority for local police and partners. To support this area of work the local authority have agreed to fund a specialist domestic violence outreach worker who is based in the Police Community Support Unit. A specialist senior domestic violence social worker has recently been appointed by the local authority to deal specifically with DV cases where there are child protection concerns.</p>
Other	<p>Hounslow was one of the first councils in the country to set up a Community Safety Partnership, which has successfully brought together agencies including the police and others to tackle and prevent crime and disorder in the borough.</p> <p>As part of Hounslow's Local Area Agreement, the Community Safety Partnership is negotiating the use of a proportion of the Local Authority Business Growth Incentive fund to expand the above initiative to other town centres across the borough. This will support the local policing agenda of tackling crime in and around town centres across the borough.</p> <p>The local authority has worked very closely with police colleagues in providing democratic input and accountability in community safety. An integrated approach has been adopted regarding community safety in Hounslow, where each police sector is made up of wards that match the Council Area Committee Boundaries. The five sectors that make up Hounslow have a dedicated Inspector responsible for working with the local community and delivering borough priorities. Each Sector Inspector is required to write an annual plan that both reflects the local needs and supports the Community Safety Strategy and the borough's Community Plan. The plan is agreed in consultation with residents and councillors and regular updates are provided to the Council's Area Committees. This structure has enabled police colleagues to improve community safety and provide environmental improvements in the borough through the use of section 106 funding.</p> <p>Through external funds received from the Home Office, Hounslow Community Safety Partnership have purchased a number of partnership</p>

	<p>vehicles from the capital allocation of the Safer, Stronger Communities Fund. One example of this is the use of the mobile CCTV van that Police colleagues are deploying in hot spot locations across the borough.</p> <p>Through closer working with the Safer Neighbourhoods teams, the local authority has been able to support a range of crime prevention projects across the borough. Recently, one such alley-gating project called 'Operation Reclaim' in Hounslow West was short listed for this year's Tilley Awards.</p> <p>The Council's funding towards community safety is small in terms of its operational costs. As well as this, Hounslow Council have not been in receipt of any neighbourhood renewal money and with pressures on existing budgets and limited resources available for community safety work it has not been possible to resource any PCs or PCSOs locally.</p> <p>By working closely with police colleagues and other partners, external Home Office funding has been aligned effectively to tackle ASB, crime and substance misuse in the borough to meet agreed partnership outcomes. This can be seen in the year on year reductions in crime levels experienced in Hounslow.</p>
