

London Councils 2015: Survey of Londoners Summary report of findings

### Background and methodology



London Councils commissioned independent researchers Ipsos MORI to conduct a poll of Londoners, with a particular focus on housing (and Right to Buy), devolution and public services. Some questions asked in a similar poll in 2013 were included to look at how views of Londoners may have changed over time.



A telephone survey of 1,000 residents aged 18+ living in Greater London using Computer-Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI).



Fieldwork took place between 27 August and 7 September 2015.



Participants selected for interview at random using Random Digit Dialling, with quotas set by age, gender, work status, ethnicity and inner/outer London (with final data also weighted to these profiles, plus tenure).



### **Key findings**


- Housing is the number one 'top of mind' issue for Londoners, with almost 9 in 10 agreeing there is currently a housing crisis in London.
- Few believe that housing will become more affordable in the next two years. 44% say they would consider leaving London if house prices and rents continue to rise.
- Renters and young adults are particularly affected by London's housing challenges: they are more likely to be stressed by housing costs, and more likely consider leaving London as a result. Most renters do not believe they will ever be able to afford to buy in London.
- Knowledge of the **Right to Buy** extension is limited, but support for the policy appears to be more conditional. Support in principle (44%) falls to one in four (26%) if the policy means less affordable housing being available in the capital. Support increases, however, if the money raised is seen to be used to tackle London's housing crisis (69%).
- Londoners are overwhelmingly most likely to most trust their local council (61%) over other institutions when it comes to making decisions locally. Londoners are supportive of the idea of further devolution of powers to the capital (62% support).
- Despite the current strain on **public services**, the majority of Londoners (57%) **do not believe that they have got worse in the last five years**. That said, more residents believe services have got worse over the last five years than better (39% vs. 23%).



#### % mentioning housing in London





#### What do you see as the most/other important issues facing London today?





Please tell me to what extent you agree or disagree with the following statement: 'There is currently a housing crisis in London'?











### More than half of Londoners say housing costs cause them a fair amount or a great deal of stress – renters in particular

To what extent, if at all, do you personally feel that concerns about the cost of your housing cause you stress these days? Do they cause you...










## Londoners are pessimistic about the future of housing in London (both in general and for their own prospects)

### Many Londoners would, or are, considering leaving London because of high housing costs

[To what extent do you agree or disagree that] 'I would consider leaving London if house prices and rents continue to rise' / 'I am considering moving out of London and taking a job in different city or region because the rent/ mortgage costs in London are too high'?



... 44% say they **would consider** leaving London if house prices and rents continue to rise.

This rises to **64% of private** renters.



...34% say they are considering moving out of London and taking a job elsewhere because of high housing costs

This rises to **48% of private** renters.
