

Appendix Three

Summary of additional emphasis for service areas derived from the two Grants Consultations, letter from MOPAC, report from Homeless Link and other evidence considered by Grants Committee at their meeting 9 March 2016.

Priority 1: Combatting Homelessness

- Increased focus on the different needs of inner and outer London tackling those at risk of homelessness, rough sleepers (including encampments/ hotspots) and 'hidden homeless'/those in unsuitable accommodation,
- Increased links made with Priority 3 Tackling Poverty through Employment and other areas (health, education, training) providing holistic provision
- Strengthened focus on non-duplication of borough duties and services and with other regional services (GLA) including groups not served through local services due their transient nature/ non-priority (such as EEA nationals, ex-offenders, LGBT fleeing violence, young people, mental health and other complex needs) and support to VCS organisation to make better links to local authorities.
- Further tenancy brokerage and sustainment services reflecting the increased needs in the private rented sector and people at risk of exploitation by rogue landlords (in particular in outer London)
- Ensuring the needs of equalities groups are reflected in service delivery (young people, BAMER, LGBT, disabled (including mental health and learning disabled), alcohol and drug misuse) reflecting the particular challenges these groups face

Priority 2: Tackling Sexual and Domestic Violence

- Better understanding of refuge need and provision across London (demand and supply data)
- Strengthened focus on non-duplication of borough duties and services and regional initiatives, including a desire for holistic after-care for borough delivered IDVA (independent domestic violence advocate) services
- Increased links made with Priority 1 Combatting Homelessness and health services
- Strengthened role in coordination of emergency refuge provision

- Strengthened support for consortium working, data gathering, demonstrating impact, strong governance, networking, representation, and financial resilience through specialist support to the sector
 - Strengthened focus on particular groups (no recourse, trafficked, LGBT, complex needs (including mental health), children and young people)
