National Careers Service

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Summary This paper updates members on the latest developments regarding the

proposed National Careers Service

Recommendations OSG members are asked to discuss the information on the National

Careers Service and consider the implications for local authorities.

Background

1. As part of the spending review the Government had previously announced that an all-age careers service would be established by April 2012 and new arrangements for careers guidance would commence from September 2011. Gerard McAlea from the Department for Education (DfE) gave a brief outline of general progress on development of the service to the last RPG meeting on 14th February 2011.

National Careers Service

2. On 13 April 2011 John Hayes, Minster of State for Further Education, Skills and Lifelong Learning¹ announced further details about the proposals. The Department of Business Innovation and Skills (BIS) will continue to fund careers services for adults both online and through helplines, and will also fund a network of public, private and voluntary organisations to provide careers guidance to adults. From April 2012 these services will be known as the National Careers Service.

Duty on Schools

 From September 2012 the Education Bill will place a new duty on schools to secure access to impartial and independent careers guidance for every pupil in Years 9 to 11.
Schools will have the freedom to decide how best to fulfil this duty, although it is stated

that guidance must be provided in an impartial manner and promote the best interests of the person to whom it is given. Additionally some legislation from the 1997 Act will be repealed, allowing schools more freedom over how they choose to provide careers education.

4. Schools will be able to access the National Careers Service for this purpose, although they will not be limited to obtaining services from these providers. The Government intends to promote a national quality standard to help schools make decisions about which provider to use. Schools will be expected to make provision for careers guidance from within the Dedicated Schools Grant.

Role of Local Authorities

- 5. The duty placed on local authorities by the Education and Skills Act 2008 (Section 68) is to make available to young people support that will "encourage, enable or assist them to participate in education or training". There is no suggestion that this duty is to be repealed.
- 6. On 13 April 2011 the DfE issued statutory guidance to local authorities on targeted support services for young people and a communication to schools on changes to the delivery of careers guidance. Boroughs will not be expected to provide universal careers service once the new careers service is established and the duty on schools has been commenced. However, local authorities will still need to support vulnerable young people to engage in education and training particularly in light of the intention to raise the participation age to 18 by 2015. Local authorities will be expected to use the Early Intervention Grant for this purpose.
- 7. Local authorities will additionally be expected to track and record young people's participation post-16 on the local Client Caseload Information System (CCIS) in order to ensure there is reliable data available centrally on young people at risk of being NEET. They will also be required to maintain close links with JobCentre Plus to ensure young people NEET are given appropriate support.

Questions to consider

8. Although schools are being encouraged to think about putting in place new arrangements for careers guidance in advance of September 2012, it is unclear what provision is going to be in place between now and then. It is also not clear what onus is on local authorities to fulfil this role in the interim? As Connexions services begin to disappear in some areas will young people receive the support they need during the coming year?
