A flavour of the level of demand for school places in Croydon

- More than 5000 new primary school places have been delivered over the last 4 years
- We opened a new secondary school this year and we will be opening another in 2017 and in 2018.
- We are projecting to need approximately 27 forms of entry by 2022




Working with Planning Colleagues

Croydon Opportunity Area

- The Croydon Local Plan: Strategic Policies and the Croydon opportunity area planning framework were adopted by the council on 22 April 2013
- They set out provision for 7300 new homes
- On Friday consultation begins on sites for a proposed 9500 homes to be included in the next stage of the Croydon Local Plan
- The opportunity area includes 3 primary school sites (secondary schools planned at borough level) and health sites
