





What do you see as the most/other important issues facing Britain today?





There is a real need to cut spending on public services in order to pay off the very high national debt we now have...






The public overwhelmingly want to prioritise protecting the NHS and education

Which two or three, if any, of the following main areas of public spending do you think should be protected from any cuts?






And the majority (69%) are now concerned that government and public services won't do enough in the future




People have different views about whether its is more important to reduce taxes or keep up government spending. How about you? Which of these statements comes closest to your own view?





What do you see as the most/other important issues facing London today?










As in the rest of Britain, Londoners want to own their home

If you had a free choice, which of these would you personally choose to live in?












Aspirations to own are sufficiently high that four in five would make trade offs to own their own home, especially younger Londoners and families


Which, if any, of the following things would you be willing to do in order to afford to buy a home?

Q. Would you support or oppose more homes being built in your local area?




Q. Which one or two, if any, of the following groups do you think would be most effective at dealing with the housing sector?

Which one of these best describes how well or badly your household is coping financially these days?















You said that you were not confident you would be able to find another similar job within 12 months, what makes you say that?













Trust in councils to make local decisions is down slightly



"There has been growing debate about devolution; that is to say transferring more powers over budgets and services from central government to cities and counties in England.





Divided over public health role


Thinking about this generally, how much do you trust your local council to take such steps as they consider appropriate to improve the health of people in your local area?
