Urban Innovation Actions	<p>Urban Innovation Actions (UIA) is an initiative of the European Commission; the programme was launched to identify and test new solutions which address issues related to sustainable urban development and are of relevance at Union level.</p> <p>The main aim of the UIA Initiative is to provide urban authorities across Europe with space and resources to test bold and unproven ideas addressing interconnected challenges and experiment how these respond to the complexity of real life. Projects supported shall be innovative, of good quality, designed</p>	<p>The fourth call for proposals is currently open – the call opened on 15 October 2018 and will close on 31 January 2019.</p> <p>The fourth call focuses on four topics: digital transformation, sustainable use of land and nature based solutions, urban poverty and urban security.</p> <p>The first two can be of relevance to transport teams in Boroughs, and more information about them can</p>	<p>The initiative has a total European Regional Development Fund (ERDF) budget of €372 million for 2014-2020. Interreg NWE	<p>The Interreg North-West Europe (NWE) Programme is a transnational European Territorial Cooperation Programme funded by the European Union.</p> <p>The programme has identified three thematic priorities: innovation, low carbon and resource and material efficiency. The three priorities cover a range of policy areas, including transport and mobility, renewable energy, climate change and resource efficiency. The three thematic priorities are subdivided into one or more specific objectives. Thematic priority two, low carbon, and objectives three and four are especially suited to local authority partners.</p> <p>Low Carbon: Addresses the challenge of finding ways to reduce Greenhouse gases (GHGs) to meet climate change goals.</p> <p>Specific Objective 3: To facilitate the uptake of low carbon technologies, products, processes and services in sectors with high energy saving potential, to reduce GHG emissions in NWE.</p>	<p>The <u>eight call for proposals</u> is coming to an end. The firsts stage deadline was on 11 June 2018 and the second is on 22 November 2018.</p> <p>Interreg NWE is a two-stage application process. The programme targets member states in NWE – Belgium, Netherlands, UK, Ireland, Luxembourg, France and Germany. Non-Member State Switzerland are also eligible. Participating project partners can be any public or private organisation that is a legal entity.</p> <p><i>Please be aware that as first stage submission having already passed, Boroughs could only join a proposal already submitted where respondents would be looking for partners.</i></p>	The programme has a budget of €372 million to co-finance projects at a rate of 60%.

URBACT	<p>The URBACT funding programme is jointly financed by the European Regional Development Fund and EU Member States. URBACT does not directly invest in urban development. Instead the programme facilitates the sharing of knowledge and good practice between cities and other levels of government, with the aim to improve the quality of planning and implementation of integrated urban plans and programmes in cities.</p> <p>The call priorities are based on the thematic areas of the EU cohesion policy for 2014-2020 of which four will be of particular interest to borough priorities:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Supporting the shift towards a low-carbon economy in all sectors (TO4) • Protecting the environment and promoting resource efficiency (TO6) • Promoting climate change adaptation, risk prevention and management (TO5) • Promoting sustainable transport and removing bottlenecks in key network infrastructures (TO7) 	<p>There is one upcoming call.</p> <p>07 January 2019: Call for the creation of Action-Planning Networks</p>	<p>The programme is co-financed by the European Regional Development Fund (ERDF); the total budget for 2014-2020 is €74 million, including €68 million dedicated to projects promoting sustainable urban development. Interreg Europe	<p>The Interreg Europe programme aim is to improve the drafting and implementation of regional policies and programmes. Connect Europe Facility	<p>The Connecting Europe Facility (CEF) supports sustainable and efficiently interconnected trans-European networks and infrastructures in the sectors of transport, telecommunications and energy. LIFE	<p>The LIFE Programme is the EU's funding instrument for the environment and climate action. To reflect the importance of climate-related action, the LIFE Programme 2014-2020 includes a dedicated sub-programme for climate action. ERDF	<p>The European Regional Development Fund (ERDF) is one of three main funds that have been set up under EU regional policy. <u>The ERDF aims to strengthen economic and social cohesion in the European Union by correcting imbalances between member states.</u> The ERDF supports projects covering a range of policy areas, including climate change and environment, energy and transport infrastructures, health, social inclusion and sustainable urban development. Projects under the ERDF will be concentrated on four thematic priorities: innovation and research, the digital agenda, support for SME's and the low-carbon economy.</p>	There are currently no open call for proposals.	<p>The programme will provide funds of £3.6 billion to support local growth across England, of which at least £605 million will support the shift to a low-carbon economy (energy efficiency and renewable energies). The percentage of funds dedicated to each sector depends on the economic development of regions. The maximum EU co-financing rate for more developed regions will be 50%.</p>
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
